Allie Kibler-Campbell was here for two weeks last month presenting the Play it Safe!® program (www.playitsafe.org) to students in grades 6 through 12.

This program is an evidence informed, specialized, age appropriate child sexual abuse risk reduction program, which covers topics, depending on the age of the intended audience, including bullying, healthy relationships, online safety, "sexting", date rape drugs, and non-stranger rape. 
Helping Students Cope with Anxiety

Anxiety is a growing source of concern for middle and high school aged children. Finding stress-reducing techniques and teaching mindfulness are two easy and helpful ways to reduce anxiety among school-aged children. Two resources to help implement would be

Some other ways to help reduce growing anxiety in your student is utilizing relaxation or grounding techniques. One relaxation and grounding technique that is easy to remember and use in daily life is the 5,4,3,2,1 method. This is a way for a person to be aware of their surroundings and help find relief:

- Acknowledge 5 things around you that you can see.
- Acknowledge 4 things around you that you can touch.
- Acknowledge 3 things around you that you can hear.
- Acknowledge 2 things around you that you can smell.
- Acknowledge 1 thing around you that you can taste.

Khan Academy Helps Students Increase SAT Scores

The juniors spent the morning of October 10th participating in PSAT testing. Two of the sections of the PSAT are math sections, one that includes the use of a calculator and one that does not. Every day in our high school math classes we are preparing students to improve their SAT scores. One of the tools that we use is KhanAcademy.org. This website has 8 practice SAT tests, and if students are linked to College Board, they are able to practice material specifically that they struggled on so they can improve their scores. Please encourage your students to take advantage of this useful tool. Higher SAT scores can result in scholarships for students and open up doors to more universities as well. Students in Algebra 1, 7th grade math, and MHS ICE are enjoying learning how to program using Micro:Bits and math concepts, including turning a banana into a keyboard, hacking each other's headphones, and creating their own computer games and communication tools.

Micro:Bits in Math

River Valley Middle and High School students have the opportunity to learn how to “code” - created computer programs - using math concepts and computer science languages using Micro:Bits this year, thanks to a grant from the Upton Foundation in partnership with Berrien RESA.

What is a Micro:Bit?

A tiny, programmable computer that offers great flexibility and increasing complexity. They can be programmed to perform tasks as well as communicate with each other. The Micro:Bit also works with a wide range of devices, including motors, sensors and servos, as well as our new Chromebooks.

Why a Micro:Bit?

In the fall of 2017, every 7th grader in the United Kingdom was given a free Micro:Bit from the BBC to increase exposure to computer science. As a result, in only its first year, the “BBC Micro:Bit Project” had a very positive impact on students. After learning how to code with the Micro:Bit:

- 90% agreed Micro:Bit helped show them anyone can code
- 88% agreed Micro:Bit helped them see coding isn't as difficult as they thought it was
- 45% said they would definitely be interested in Computer Science as a subject option in the future, up from 36% before they used the Micro:Bit. This was even more accentuated for girls, increasing from 23% before they used the Micro:Bit to 39% afterwards, a 70% increase

Because of the enthusiasm of the students already involved in the project globally, there is an enormous amount of content readily available for use, including curriculum materials developed by other students, Google, and Microsoft that we will be using with our Micro:Bits.

What will we do with the Micro:Bits?

Once students are very familiar and comfortable with programming and using the Micro:Bits, we will integrate them into our math work, as well as explore other cross curricular connections that they can be implemented with. We will also explore the connections between math and computer science, as well as career opportunities that students may wish to pursue in these fields.

Students will have an opportunity to showcase their work and teach others how to use Micro:Bits at the Southwest Michigan Mini Maker Faire held annually in St. Joseph in June.



Science Fun For Everyone

Middle School students are focusing on lab basics. The 6th grade students learn precise measurement taking at the beginning of the year. They practice using pieces of lab equipment and tools appropriately. Students measured various items using SI units and the metric system. These students are beginning to study how organisms are classified, looking at structure and function in detail. Investigations involving force and motion are keeping the 7th graders busy. The 8th graders are exploring and gathering evidence about the composition of Earth, analyzing the relationship between Earth's structure, rock cycle, and tectonic plate movement.



As for the high school students, our world's challenges will be solved by those with hope, perseverance, and the passionate optimism to solve them. These students are investigating Newton's Laws of Motion and Gravity, analyzing the cell theory to understand how cells become specialized, and piecing together quantum mechanics. Teaching science is phenomenal because students need to see the world through the eyes of a scientist. Physics students are testing projectile motion. Forensics Science students are looking at crime scene investigation. The AP Environmental Science students are gathering species diversity data to measure the health of a stream ecosystem.

Invasive Species

First off, what are invasive species? Invasive species are non native animals that are somehow transported to an area where they're not supposed to be. This can cause many problems for the animals in that area, and a lot of the times it affects the people too. Some examples of invasive species are zebra mussels, asian carp, and Kudzu (a type of fast growing plant). Some of the problems that they cause are that the zebra mussels are very fast growing and populating animal, they eat mud plankton, leaving many fish foodless and ruining a river or lake. They also attach themselves to ships and boats, causing problems and sometimes leading to damaged or clogged pipes. Asian carp are big fish that eat a lot. They also stir up rivers or lakes causing sediment to flow thru the water limiting the type of fish that can survive there.

The reasons that make this a big problem are that we are spending over 120 billion dollars annually on dealing with invasive species, and not many people are actually doing something about it because it’s not on their radar. Over 100 million acres are covered in invasive plants (roughly the size of California.) Many crops and over-land areas get taken over by these invasive plants and were left to pay for it.



Recent information on this is the tsunami that hit Japan in 2011 which carried different algae and mussels over the Pacific to places like California, and states on the east coast. The best way to stop this second most threat to biodiversity, is don't let it occur in the first place. Some ways you can help is by fishing with native bait, don't move firewood, and if you have pets, take good care of them.




